

# THE GRAND PARK OF THE PALACE OF VERSAILLES

In 1661, Louis XIV commissioned André Le Nôtre to create the iconic gardens of Versailles, a project that spanned over 40 years alongside the construction of the palace. The gardens, transformed from meadows and marshes, maintain their design through a century-replanting cycle initiated by Louis XVI and continued by Napoleon III and most recently in 1999 after a storm. The Grand Park of the Palace of Versailles, with its rich history involving rulers, religious leaders, politicians, and the French Revolution, holds many untold secrets.

# SANDRINGHAM ESTATE

Nestled in the 8,000-hectare Sandringham Estate, Sandringham House features enchanting gardens shaped by generations of the Royal Family since 1863. Notable for Queen Elizabeth II's late-1960s influence, the gardens boast lush shrubbery, a woodland walk, and formal enclosed areas designed by Geoffrey Jellicoe in 1947. Recently, King Charles III announced plans to transform one of the lawns into an eco-friendly topiary garden.

## **SANSSOUCI**

Built by Prussian King Frederick the Great as his summer palace, Sanssouci is often considered a German counterpart to Versailles. Initiated by Frederick in 1744, the transformation of a barren hillside into terraced vineyards resulted in three expansive terraces featuring a diverse array of fruit and wine varieties. Sanssouci Park, with 3,000 fruit trees and greenhouses cultivating oranges, melons, peaches, and bananas, reflects Frederick's vision and invites visitors to relive a bygone era of Prussian royalty amidst a remarkable fusion of architecture and landscape gardening.

# BANSKA ŠTIAVNICA BOTANICAL GARDEN

The Botanical Garden in Banská Štiavnica, Slovakia, is a lush oasis preserving diverse plant species, established alongside the historic Mining Academy in 1762 by Empress Maria Theresa. Now used by local high schools, the Neo-Renaissance premises showcase architectural splendour. The garden, created for forestry education, features trees planted since the 19th century, including giant sequoias and cedar.

# HAMPTON COURT GARDENS

In Hampton Court Palace, the gardens, initially shaped by Cardinal Wolsey in the 16th century and expanded by King Henry VIII, boast diverse styles like the Privy Garden and the Great Fountain Garden. The enduring legacy is embodied by the world's oldest and largest grapevine, the Great Vine, while the Hampton Court Maze adds an adventurous touch. Walked by queens such as Anne Boleyn and Catherine Howard, these gardens offer an enchanting atmosphere where centuries of stories unfold with each step.

# EL REAL JARDÍN BOTÁNICO

Established in 1755 by King Ferdinand VI, Madrid's Real Jardin Botanico uniquely serves as both a research institute and a botanical garden. Relocated in 1781 to its present Paseo del Prado location under King Charles III's orders, the garden endured challenges, including a cyclone in 1886. Recognized as an Artistic Monument in 1942, it stands as a testament to its historical roots, educational mission, and commitment to advancing botanical science.

# VILLA D'ESTE

Villa d'Este, a UNESCO World Heritage Site in Tivoli near Rome, epitomizes the Italian Renaissance. Commissioned by Cardinal Ippolito II d'Este, son of Lucrezia Borgia, and designed by Pirro Logorio, the villa features a 4-hectare complex with a residential palace and renowned gardens. The gardens boast around a hundred masterful fountains, including the Fontana dell'Ovata and Bernini's Fontana del Bicchierone. A Renaissance art and architecture masterpiece, Villa d'Este is a testament to Cardinal Ippolito II d'Este's vision and grandeur.

# SCHÖNBRUNN GARDEN

Schönbrunn's baroque garden, commissioned by Maria Teresa to assert power and rival Versailles, is a historic masterpiece. Built amid wars, the palace and gardens, featuring the iconic 'Vienna Yellow' colour, reflect the empress's resilience in ruling a vast empire and mothering 16 children. Notable elements include parterres, the Gloriette, and the 'oldest in the world' Tiergarten Zoo. Opened to the public in 1779, Schönbrunn stands as a symbol of order and authority. From Napoleon's headquarters to the Habsburg Emperor's 1918 abdication, the garden bears witness to the rise and fall of empires.
